What Worked for Me

PLUG: Dabbled with online meetings

Software Projects: *A great* distraction

Conferences: I presented online

Bi-Weekly Project Calls: RAN WITH IT

What Worked for Me

Realization

The quarterly or annual conference cadence is really inefficient

What Worked for Me

My New Cadence?

Host three calls a week and attend
two to four others

Totally transparent and open to all

World-writable agenda/minutes

Posted recordings

CallForTesting.org Required Skills

Mental Multitasking

Moderation

Recording and “Editing”

The New Era

Conferences became reunions

“You have legs!”

Online meeting *skills*

Sustainability

Skills and muscle memory are key

Make it look easy because it's *finally* easy
